Welcome and Introductions

Ms. Sarah Simmons introduced Cherokee County Board Designee, David Kubala who welcomed the group on behalf of the Metro Water District Governing Board and officially convened the meeting. Group introductions followed.

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District's 2012 Legislative Agenda

Mr. Matt Harper gave an overview of each of the bills on the District's 2012 Legislative Agenda. He explained that these bills are still active in the Georgia General Assembly and that the District is tracking their progress at the capitol as they contain items/issues of particular interest for the District. BAC members had the following questions and comments:

- There are three or four bills dealing with interbasin transfer. Is it an EPA restriction to prevent water basin transfers? Georgia DNR adopted a rule last year to guide the permitting process and protect the donor and receiving basins.
- Do we know of any negative impact to development in these bills?
- Do any of these get significantly impacted by the tri-state water legislation?
- EPD should revise the Antidegradation Policy. New questions need to be asked of EPD.
- The issues involved with HB 153 are complex.
- The state passed the Water Stewardship Act a couple of years ago. All water systems serving 3,300 people or more will have to do their own water audit through AWWA.

2011 Implementation Review and Annual Report

Ms. Sarah Simmons gave an overview of the Metro Water District's 2011 Plan Implementation Review and the 2011 Activities and Progress Report. She explained the two reports and highlighted information from the Plan Implementation Review. There were no questions and comments.

Wastewater Management Plan Overview

Mr. Corey Babb gave an overview of the Wastewater Management Plan, highlighted some of the key regional issues with wastewater management and discussed the measures of the plan of particular importance to local wastewater utilities as identified by the 2011 Plan Implementation Review. BAC members had the following questions and comments:

- Any thought on nutrient management?
- Education is the first step to keeping grease out of the pipes.
- You need to be careful about putting more costs on the developers because they will pass it to the homeowner. There has been good participation so far, but be careful to minimize mandatory costs.
- The biggest change to water conservation legislation is plumbing codes.
- Soon, 1.28 gallon flush toilets will be the only kind you can buy in Georgia.
- In the near future it will not be as hard to find people who are conservation minded. Instead of having to make these measures mandatory, the consumer will simply ask for it.
- Part of the education process needs to include a lesson on where the money comes from. We have to help people balance requests.
- EPA has integrated wastewater and stormwater system management. Will the District do anything like this?
- Has the District taken a look at streamlining some of the requirements/processes?
- The Corps has new culvert requirements that may affect best management practices.
